# **Safeguarding Statement**

#### 1. Introduction

Gillingham Town Council staff and councillors do not work directly with children or vulnerable adults as part of their roles. However, while performing duties in the community, concerns may occur.

The purpose of this document is to ensure that staff and councillors understand how to report a safeguarding concern.

### 2. Recognising Abuse

#### What is Abuse?

Abuse is when someone does something to somebody which damages their quality of life or puts them at risk of harm. It may be deliberate or unintentional.

Abuse takes many forms and includes:

Type of abuse	Examples
Harm	Hitting, injuring or restraining
	Threatening, intimidating or humiliating
	Sexual attention or activity that is not wanted
	Keeping someone on their own
Neglect	Not giving the correct medicine
	Not providing food or clothing
	Not arranging the right care
Financial	Stealing or misusing money or property
	Pressure relating to wills or inheritance
Domestic	Violence
Discrimination	Treating someone less favourably because of race,
	ethnicity, religion, age, gender, disability or sexual orientation

#### Signs of Abuse

There are many possible signs of abuse, none being conclusive on their own. Examples include:

- Unexplained injury/weight loss/cuts and bruises/dirtiness
- Changes in behaviour
- Depression/low self-esteem
- Lack of self-care/dehydration/abnormal eating pattern
- Harm to self
- Obsessive behaviour
- Bills not being paid
- An overly critical or disrespectful carer who may bully or undermine
- Isolation from usual network of friends, family or community

#### Radicalisation and extremism

Radicalisation is the process by which someone comes to believe or support extremist ideologies that are associated with terrorist groups. Extremist views can be political, religious or ideological. In some cases, radicalisation can lead to involvement in terrorist groups or acts.

### 3. Reporting Concerns

If you are concerned that an adult, child or young person is at immediate risk of significant harm, and you believe it requires urgent action, call the police on 999.

You must not attempt to investigate abuse yourself, confront anyone who is allegedly responsible for abuse or tell them that allegations have been made about them.

Safeguarding allegations or concerns must be reported at the earliest possible opportunity and at least within 24 hours.

Reports regarding adults are made to the Dorset Council Adult Access Team. Reports regarding children are made to the Dorset Council Children's Advice and Duty Service (ChAD). Contact details are available from this link: Report a safeguarding concern - tasks and guides (dorsetcouncil.gov.uk)

If you believe that someone is at risk of radicalisation you can help them obtain support and prevent them becoming involved in terrorism by raising your concerns and making a referral - Prevent - Dorset Council

A councillor or member of staff must report any allegation made against them to the Town Clerk or Mayor.

Safeguarding concerns and allegations relating to councillors will be referred to the Monitoring Officer and dealt with in accordance with the Code of Conduct.
