#### A new roof and solar panels at Roman Court Workshops

At the town council meeting held on 11 October 2023, it was resolved to seek the approval from the Department for Levelling Up, Housing and Communities (DLUHC) to apply for a Public Works Loan Board (PWLB) loan of £90,000 over the borrowing term of over 12.5 but not over 13 years. This is for the purpose of replacing the roof and installing photovoltaic panels at the council's workshops at Roman Court in Gillingham.



The annual loan repayments will come to around £9,752.90. It is not intended to increase the council tax precept for the purpose of the loan repayments.

#### **Communication Board for Hardings Park**

A communication board has been installed at Hardings Park following a request made to the Town Council by a local resident.

A communication board is a device displaying symbols or illustrations to help individuals with limited or no language skills communicate more easily. Different types of communication boards can help children with autism in addition to other disabilities.

play areas as accessible as possible. This board will give children who struggle with speech and language an opportunity to have a voice.

## **GRITTING AND CLEARING SNOW IN GILLINGHAM**

#### Is it ok to clear snow from a road, path or cycleway?

Guidelines from the UK Government say it is ok to clear snow and ice from pavements yourself.

## HOW TO CLEAR SNOW AND ICE

When you clear snow and ice:

- do it early in the day it's easier to move fresh, loose snow;
- don't use water it might refreeze and turn to black ice;
- use salt if possible it will melt the ice or snow and stop it from refreezing overnight (but don't use the salt from salting bins as this is used to keep roads clear);
- you can use ash and sand if you don't have enough salt it will provide grip underfoot;
- pay extra attention when clearing steps and steep pathways using more salt may help.

#### A tribute to past Mayor and Freeman the late David Milsted

Gillingham's flag was flown at half-mast and a minute silence was held before the meeting of Gillingham Town Council on 27 November in memory of David Milsted, former Mayor and Freeman of Gillingham who passed away, after a period of treatment for cancer, on 20 November 2023.

An enthusiastic writer, researcher, editor, teacher, fireman and postman, David threw himself into helping the community as a town councillor for 17 years and Mayor of Gillingham in 2011 and 2014.

David served as a Dorset County Councillor and was a District Councillor for North Dorset District Council for 15 years where he was the Liberal Democrat Group Leader and Chairman of the Scrutiny Committee. In 2019 David was made an Honorary Alderman of North Dorset.

David was a director of the former Blackmore Vale Tourism and Development Company who operated the Tourist Information Centre in Shaftesbury for nine years, and was a founder member of the Blackmore Vale Credit Union.

As an active member of the Dorset Fire Authority, David was a workstream Chairman for an independent review into the fire and rescue service in England.

During his 'spare' time David enjoyed performing with the Gillingham Arts Workshop and trod the boards as a hilarious Pantomime Dame.

David is survived by his loving wife Annie, his six sons and two grandchildren.

A true champion for our community, David will be greatly missed.

There will be an opportunity for those whose lives were touched by David to join his family in a celebration of his life taking place in Gillingham on Saturday 17<sup>th</sup> February – further information to follow.









#### **Register to vote**

The next election for Dorset Council and Town and Parish Councils will be held on 2 May 2024. The election for the Police and Crime Commissioner in Dorset will also take place on the same date.

Residents in Dorset who are not registered to vote are encouraged to do so now ahead of the local elections. This includes anyone who has moved home or changed their names since the last annual canvass.


Registering is the first step in the voting process. The second is choosing which method to use to vote, either in person, by post, or by appointing someone trusted to vote on your behalf, which is known as a proxy vote.

You can register to vote online on the Dorset Council website – you will need to give your National Insurance number and date of birth.

#### **Postal Voting**

Voting by post is an easy and convenient way of voting. You can apply to set up a postal vote for just one election, referendum or poll, for example if you're going to be on holiday on polling day, or for a specific period of time or for up to a maximum of 3 years. You can also have your postal vote sent



#### Bring photo ID to vote

Voters in England now need to show photo ID to vote at polling stations in some elections.

This applies to:

- UK parliamentary elections, including general elections, by-elections and recall petitions
- Local elections and by-elections
- Police and Crime Commissioner elections

If you don't have accepted photo ID, you can apply for a free voter ID document, which is known as a Voter Authority Certificate.

- Two allotment sites
- Gillingham Cemetery and Garden of Remembrance
- Several buildings including Gillingham Town Hall and Roman Court Workshops
- Two War Memorials
- Fourteen members of staff
- And much more ...

Gillingham is one of the fastest growing towns in Dorset and it is an exciting time to become a Councillor.

Here are some of the things that you could influence:

- The design of new recreational areas for the town, including new sports facilities
- The delivery of new infrastructure
- The review of the Gillingham Neighbourhood Plan
- The improvement of the Council's carbon footprint
- The protection and enhancement of the town's natural environment
- The conservation of the town's historic environment

To stand for election you must:

- be on the electoral register for Gillingham; or
- have resided in the parish of Gillingham for the past twelve months or rented/tenanted land in the parish; or
- your principal place of work is in the parish; or
- you live within three miles (direct) of the Town Council boundary.

The Civic Hall is part of Gillingham Town Hall and is the ideal venue to get married, celebrate baby naming, renew your vows or celebrate the life of a loved one. The Civic Hall, formerly the Magistrates Court, was built in 1890 and is an impressive room with a high beamed ceiling. The Civic Hall holds 60 people seated and has wheelchair access and easily accessible toilet facilities.
